Introduction

At Ashford School we believe that if a pupil is happy and secure they are more likely to be successful. We believe that learning should be challenging, motivating and lead to a sense of fulfilment, which is why we provide an inspiring environment that encourages growth and adventure so that our students can develop into all they are capable of being.

The School's approach to learning ensures that academic rigour is at the centre of all curriculum planning and lesson delivery. This enables pupils to develop the confidence both in and beyond the classroom in order to brave new experiences, learn from mistakes and take measured risks.

Assessment and Evaluating Examination Results

The purpose of internal assessment at Ashford School is to:

- Track pupil's academic and social progress and achievement
- Gather information that will improve the effectiveness of teaching and learning throughout the school and be central to classroom practice
- Gather information about the attainment of individuals, groups and cohorts against National Standards
- Gather information that will inform the school's strategic planning

In addition to internal assessments, Ashford School uses a variety of external assessments (such as baseline testing) to inform teaching and learning. In total, all these assessments are intended to facilitate student progress and the evaluation of that progress against relevant national norms.

Overall, internal and external assessments help to:

- monitor the effectiveness of teaching and schemes of work
- build up a profile of pupil achievement
- · recognise and highlight achievement
- motivate pupils, providing positive encouragement
- aid improvement in performance
- diagnose difficulties, providing information about areas needing reinforcement or the need for additional support
- know where each pupil is in his/her development
- know where each pupil needs to go next
- identify pupils who are very able and need extending and in which areas
- assess whether the planning, resources and learning objectives are appropriate
- assess how pupils are applying their skills, knowledge and understanding across the curriculum

The Senior Leadership Team monitors public examination results. These results are then reviewed with reference to the School's Aims and specific departmental targets. Examination results are also evaluated through Department Review Meetings in the autumn of each year, where academic targets are put in place. In these meetings, public examination performance at Ashford School is analysed against similar centres and all centres. In addition, Ashford School public examination performance is compared with national performance norms through analysis of data from FFT Education Datalab. Any implications are considered for inclusion in the School's Strategic Plan as necessary.

Pre Senior Baccalaureate

The PSB (Pre Senior Baccalaureate) is a framework that has at its heart the development of the values, skills, attitudes and behaviours required for children to succeed and flourish in an everchanging world. With a greater recognition than ever on the importance of a well-rounded education, the PSB Aware places significant importance on developing each child as a skilled and positive learner. The PSB framework enables us to place greater emphasis on the achievements of the whole child, across all areas of school life, in a way that celebrates how they have performed on a daily basis rather than solely within a formalised test environment.

The PSB Core Skills are:

- 1. Thinking and Learning
- 2. Reviewing and Improving
- 3. Communicating
- 4. Independence
- 5. Collaboration
- 6. Leadership

The PSB Core Skills are also mapped against our ABC values to ensure that pupils recognise and appreciate how these can go hand in hand with each other.

The culmination of a child's time at Ashford Prep School is recognised by an individualised PSB Award Diploma.

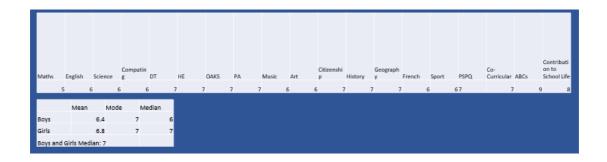
Subject Average Results on PSB 10-point grading scale:

A grade scale has been created for each subject as well as wider areas of the curriculum including the children's contribution to School life; their participation to the co-curriculum programme; the Always Be Caring behaviour code in addition to their PSPQ project.

Grading scale:

1-3 Working towards; 4-6 Expected; 7-9 Exceeding; 10 Exceptional

The table shows the averages across all subjects and gender breakdown.



Total % average of cohort of 53 using the 10-point scale of 10 areas (faculties were averaged): 67% showing an average of high expected within this year group (50% showing the average child).

The average grading across all areas of the curriculum is grade 7 showing exceptional elements.

PSPQ Results Summer 2023:

Projects grades awarded at the end of the year:

Scale: Bronze <64%; Silver 65-74%; Gold 75-85%; Gold with distinction 86% Awarded: 18 Bronze, 13 Silver, 19 Gold and 3 Gold + with distinction.

Average % Score of overall project across the cohort: 69%, highlighting an overall achievement of high expected/exceeding level.

Summer Assessment Results

At the Prep School, we use PIRA (Progress In Reading Assessment) and PUMA (Progress Understanding Maths Assessment) tested termly in addition to a writing assessment. These results are tracked through Year 1-6 and assist us with informing teaching and learning and planning focuses on monitoring progress and understanding. Pupil progress meetings are held termly.
