Head of UCAS and Higher Education Dr Edward Wilson

Since we returned from the Christmas break, it has been a busy and productive period for students across the school working towards their tertiary education and employment goals.

Inevitably, at this stage of the year, the Sixth Form has been the main focus of this effort. All Year 13s applying for universities in the UK this year submitted their UCAS applications by the deadline of 29th January; pleasingly, many students are already in receipt of at least one offer from the universities to which they applied, and almost as many are now having to make tricky but exciting decisions about where their future lies after the summer. With university becoming an imminent reality for so many Year 13s, over the coming weeks they will be given talks about related topics, including how to accept offers and organise and apply for student finance.

In order to prepare Year 12 for the same process, I have begun to speak to each of them individually about their plans and aspirations for their lives after they have finished their A Levels. Although each of these conversations is different, they tend to start with an education or career goal to be achieved several years from now, and then work backwards, attempting to plot a precise course from that achievement to the present moment. While some students already have a very well-developed sense of what they hope the next few years have in store for them, others are less certain; regardless, whether they are intending to pursue an apprenticeship, apply for university or go straight into work, all of them are developing clear plans about what they need to do next to open up exciting options for the future. It is wonderful to hear their thoughts about the direction they hope their lives will take, and the ways in which they can use their individual skills and personal qualities to make a contribution to the world.

To offer a more structured and holistic path to applying for university, apprenticeships and work, Mr Grech and I have made the decision to join Unifrog, which is an integrated platform for finding and comparing university courses and apprenticeships. It also has a handy tool for identifying and applying for work experience opportunities, which will be of huge benefit to our Year 12 students in particular. We look forward to introducing this to students in the second half of the Spring Term.

Careers in Law trip

Four Sixth Form students had the opportunity to visit the wonderful Draper's Hall. The students got to visit the City of London Court and they met legal professionals, including lawyers and solicitors, and participated in a mock trial with Their Honours Judge Marc David Dight CBE and Judge Saunders, successfully defending the accused from a custodial sentence. They had a speed networking session with professionals representing a variety of different types of legal careers, and enjoyed a splendid lunch. The students had a fantastic day and have come away inspired to seek a career in Law.



ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Lister Wilder visit

Nine students from Years 11-13 had the fantastic opportunity to experience the world of work at Lister Wilder in Henwood Industrial Estate. After a short walk from the school, the students were given a presentation into the history of the company and an introduction to the Apprenticeship opportunities available to them if they were to join the Kubota team.



The second part of the day provided the students with practical experiences:

- Completing a manual wheel change on a 4x4 in the fastest time possible. Ed T in Year 13 won the inter-school competition, finishing in an impressive 2 minutes 30 seconds and taking home the coveted Kubota cup.
- Live experience of finding parts in the workshop. Students were taught how to use the internal database to cross reference a specific piece of machinery and to then find parts for the customer to enable them to fix their product. This required students to work their way around the workshop to locate the specific parts.

- Excavator task. Students got to operate the excavator and had the challenging task of lifting a golf ball out of the sand and then into the scoring tubes. This was a difficult task which required precision and patience, especially when they had the added pressure of the clock. Again, Ed T took the prize, scoring a whopping 550 points, which resulted in him taking home the Kubota rugby ball.
- Technical diagnostics walkthrough. Students were guided through the process of completing diagnostic reviews of machinery entirely through the use of technology.



The students had a great day, really engaging with the activities, and came away with an understanding of a possible career route in agriculture.

NATIONAL CAREERS WEEK

National Careers Week takes place on 3rd-8th March. Ashford School will hold a series of events for Years 7-9 in which they will participate in some Business-themed activities as a year group.

These experiences will develop students' problem solving skills, requiring outside the box thinking and presentation.



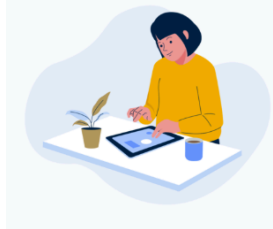
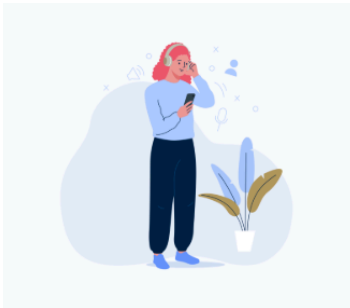
The [Virtual Careers Fair](#) goes live on 3rd March, giving pupils a chance to engage with over a hundred employers.

MY SUPER CURRICULAR

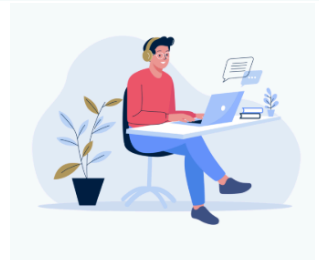

INTERNATIONAL CAREER MENTORING

Choosing what to do after school can feel massive. Whether you're thinking about university or diving straight into a job, it's essential to get your head around career planning. ICM focuses on an interlinked world and helps make the right destination and career choices by considering risks, opportunities, and challenges. It prepares you to defend your study or career decisions with an understanding of global socioeconomic, demographic, and cultural trends.

- Global Opportunities: ICM explores jobs, quality of life, education and more around the world.
- Cultural Diversity: ICM helps you understand and work with people from different backgrounds.
- Future-Proofing: ICM discusses the obstacles and risks associated with career choices and focuses on handling them successfully.
- Interview Skills: ICM equips you to handle university and job interviews effectively.
- Inclusivity: ICM sees local and national settings in an increasingly global context, while inviting others to get to know us and work with us more productively.

ICM doesn't just look at what makes a job appealing, but, crucially, it also considers its drawbacks. It's not just about landing that first job, it's about how to keep it and avoid burning out. 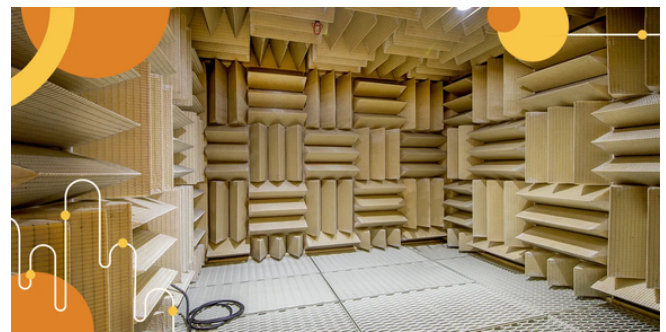

EXTERNAL OPPORTUNITIES



If you would like to earn while you learn, an apprenticeship could be for you. The Government's [**Apprenticeships website**](#) explains what being an apprentice involves and can help you make an informed decision on [**whether an apprenticeship is right for you**](#).

Apprenticeship levels range from level 2 through to level 7.

Level 2 (equivalent to GCSE)

No prior experience or specific skills are needed.

Example: Level 2 Metal Welding is suitable for beginners with no prior experience.

Level 3 (equivalent to A level)

Some qualifications or experience may be required.

Example: Level 3 Business Administration is ideal for those with basic office or retail experience.

Levels 4 to 5 (equivalent to Higher National Certificate/Diploma)

You'll need relevant qualifications or experience for more complex tasks.

Example: Level 4 Lead Engineering Maintenance Technician requires prior knowledge of engineering maintenance.

Levels 6 to 7 (Degree and Master's level)

These apprenticeships can lead to a bachelor's or master's degree. Entry requirements vary but may include qualifications like A Levels and skills in areas like communication, IT, or problem-solving.

Example: Level 6 Chartered Manager is for those with significant leadership or management experience.

The judges will award a top prize of £100 in each age category (Years 7-9, Years 10-11 and Years 12-13), as well as prizes of £25 to a maximum of two runners up. The deadline for submitting your entry is 12 noon on 31st March 2025.



HIGHER EDUCATION

Year 13's final UCAS applications were submitted at the end of January. Students have begun to receive offers from universities and are working with renewed focus to achieve the grades they require to secure their place on their chosen courses. **Year 12** are at the early stages of the UCAS process, thinking about their goals and researching university and employment opportunities.

At five years old, I knew exactly what I wanted to be: a vet, and it was my time at Ashford School that truly helped me achieve this childhood dream. The staff at Ashford knew me and my interests. When I joined Ashford School in Year 7, I was quiet and with little drive to achieve my best. Through my seven years at Ashford, I grew in confidence and ability. The small classes meant I felt my teachers really knew me, my interests and needs, allowing them to support me in pushing myself to be the best I could be. The staff were always willing to give their time to help, whether in revising for exams or writing my university application.

I successfully applied to veterinary school and finally achieved my childhood dream. I have no doubt that without my Ashford School education, made possible with the bursary fund, I would not be where I am today.
